Camino de Santiago

Se remonta al siglo IX (9th), el Camino de Santiago (the Way of St. James) is a vast network of pilgrim routes running through Europe that converge in the city of Santiago de Compostela, located in the northern province of Galacia, España.

When our students participate in walking a portion of the *Camino*, they not only get to walk along side pilgrims from all over the world, they also get to experience firsthand the diverse geography and culture within Spain.

Upon arrival to the city, the group takes a tour of the downtown, visits the Cathedral and shire where the reliquary of St. James and finishes with a tour of the cathedral rooftop.
